

### Webcast spotlight Missing area woman's story to be part of California concert

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Sometimes persistence pays off.

That's true for Gail Soles, a West Andrews woman whose daughter Crystal, 29, disappeared Jan. 24, 2005, from Shaw's Corner Store in Andrews. Gail's continued efforts to tell her daughter's story have reached as far as California. Crystal and other East Coast missing persons will be spotlighted Saturday, when singer/songwriter Kelly Fitzgerald and Jannel Rap the C Street Band perform a live Webcast concert from 8 to 10 p.m. at Kulak's Woodshed in North Hollywood, Calif. Anyone with Internet access will be able to view the concert at Kulak's Web site, [www.kulakswoodshed.com/webcast.shtml](http://www.kulakswoodshed.com/webcast.shtml).

Saturday's concert, Gail said, will provide the national coverage she believes her daughter's case — and every missing person's case — needs.

"We're very glad to hear about this concert because we feel like it needs to go everywhere just in case someone somewhere outside Andrews knows something," she said.

Gail and some 25 others (including family members) plan to conduct a search Saturday throughout Andrews. The search will begin at 10:30 a.m. at Shaw's Corner Market in Andrews.

"We're going door-to-door and asking questions because we haven't gotten answers any other way," Gail said. "Maybe someone will talk to us in person. Somebody's got to know something."

"We're doing all we know to do."

Another effort to raise awareness, Saturday's Webcast concert is sponsored by "GINA (Greater Information Now Available) for Missing Persons," an organization founded by Jannel after her sister, Regina "Gina" Bos, disappeared Oct. 17, 2000, after a pub performance in Lincoln, Neb.

There are no suspects and no leads.

She was never seen again.

Her sister's story, according to Jannel, "lacked the hook and intrigue to get the attention of the national public." Six months after Gina's disappearance, Jannel formed her organization "to get attention for the missing." Since then, 150 concerts have been performed nationwide, two nonprofit organizations have been formed ([www.411Gina.org](http://www.411Gina.org) and [www.411Warrior.org](http://www.411Warrior.org)) and a TV show called "America Lost and FOUND" and a monthly international webcast featuring East Coast missing persons have been started.
